BOATING SAFETY - - A "MUST" FOR BOATING FUN

The U.S. Coast Guard is most concerned over the number of small boats that have capsized recently on the surrounding waters with the resultant tragic loss of life. As a matter of fact, statistics recently released by the Coast Guard revealed capsizing of small boats to be the most prevalent boating accident leading to loss of life during last year's boating season.

Many articles have been written, and many things have been said about boating safety; however, much factual information of considerable indirect importance has not received wide publication, and other boating safety information could bear repeating.

Some hints on safety afloat. Before getting underway be sure you know your boat, your machinery and its operation. The following list is not complete, but these items should be included on your presailing check-off list:

- 1. Check the weather; do not depart in the face of adverse reports.
- 2. Let somebody know where you are going and when you plan to return.
- 3. Check your fuel supply. Be sure you have enough for your round trip; plus a reserve.
 - 4. Stow all gear properly.
- 5. Carry Coast Guard approved life-saving equipment for all hands.
- 6. Do not attempt to start engine in the event of strong odor of gasoline on board.
- 7. Carry simple tools, spare shear pin, plugs, etc.

Loading your boat. A person moving about in the average small boat has a large effect on the boat's stability. So here are a few things to remember:

- 1. Don't stand up in a small boat.
- 2. Keep the load as low as possible.
- 3. Don't overload. Use OBC boat gross weight certification as a guide.
 - 4. Distribute the load evenly.

Remember, as your load increases the boat sinks lower in the water which reduces freeboard (distance from water to top edge of boat's side, or "gunwale".) Take along fewer friends and keep them longer.

Emergency procedures. The prudent boatman would be wise to take a tip from professional seagoing men who know the value of being prepared for emergencies. A man going boating in a large or small craft should formulate procedures in advance that he would follow in the event of certain of the more common emergencies. In this way his actions will be automatic, fast, and correct.

Two emergency situations that reactions to should be preplanned are a man overboard and abandoning ship. From time to time it is a wise thing for the operator to consider what he would do if one of these emergencies occurred at some particular moment.

Also, it is well to familiarize at least one other person with the operation of the boat and engines and the man overboard procedure, as the person who falls overboard might be you. Caution should be employed when starting the engine to insure that the engine throttle is set at idle and the gears are in neutral. Numerous persons have gone overboard due to rapid boat acceleration when the engine starts with throttle wide open and gears engaged.

The following steps are recommended in the case of a man overboard:

- 1. Swing the stern of the boat away from the man. This will reduce the propeller danger to the man overboard.
- 2. Throw a lifesaving device to him as soon as possible, even if he can swim. Don't wait to get a life ring if there is another lifesaving device closer at hand. Speed may be most important.

Keep the man in view at all times. If it is night, direct the best possible light on the man in the water.

- 4. Normally maneuver to approach the man from downwind or into the sea (waves).
- 5. If you have capable assistance in the boat with you, it might be advisable to have your assistant put on a life preserver with a line attached to the boat and get into the water to assist the person who fell overboard.

6. Assist the man in boarding the boat.

It is often difficult to climb into a boat from the water, and if a man is hurt or cold he may not be capable of pulling himself in without assistance. Recommended procedure for going over the side or coming aboard a small boat is by the way of the stern or bow, depending on the boat's size and construction. Common sense dictates that the engine should be stopped when taking a man over the stern. A stopped outboard motor can be a great aid to a person attempting to board a small boat.

Abandoning Ship. Many ships and boats involved in casualties have continued to float indefinitely. If it becomes necessary to abandon your boat due to fire, swamping, capsizing and other emergencies, don't leave the area. Generally a damaged boat can be sighted more readily than a person in the water and it may help to keep you afloat. When practicable attempt to right the boat and bail it out.

Keep in mind that distance over water is deceptive. Usually the estimated distance is much shorter than the actual distance. Keep your head and restrain your initial impulse to swim ashore, then calmly weigh the facts of the situation such as: Injuries to passengers, water temperature, and the proximity of shore and your swimming abilities, before deciding upon your course of action.

Before abandoning ship don your life preserver and utilize distress signals. However, don't foolishly waste distress signaling devices where remote likelihood of on scene assistance exists. Wait until you sight someone or something. If your vessel is equipped with a radio telephone, a distress message should be sent.

Time is often of vital importance. The time available to await rescue may depend on the temperature of the water, weather moving into the area of distress, elapsed time since occurrence of the distress, and whether survivors are in the water, liferaft or lifeboat.

Do You Know? . .

Do you know that the Coast Guard will come to the aid of any disabled boat? Do not hesitate to call if you should know of any one who needs their services.

Do you know that the Michigan law requires all power boats, regardless of size, to be registered? Is your boat registered? If not, get an application from the Sheriff's Department of Leelanau County.

Do you know that Junior memberships to the Omena Traverse Yacht Club are available for those between the ages of 14 and 21?

Do you know that guest memberships are also available. The cost is \$5.00 for each adult guest and \$2.50 for each guest between the ages of 14 and 21. If you rent your cottage, and wish a sign to place in it regarding guest memberships, see your secretary.

Do you know that our Club has a membership in the Lake Michigan Yachting Association? As members of the Omena Traverse Yacht Club you are entitled to have your boat listed in the Year Book. You may join the L. M. Y. A. for \$5.00 a year which entitles you to participate in the many activities of the member clubs, as well as to receive the Year Book. If you wish an application or registration card, see your secretary. However individual membership is not necessary to have your boat listed. Copies of the 1963 Year Book are at the Yacht Club.

Do you know that due to the very negative response from members about helping with the Turkey Dinner, it looks like your Commodora will have to pitch in and do it herself. Some of you just have to help!!!!

Motor Boat Registration

The Michigan Boat Registration law requires that every owner of a boat propelled by mechanical means, regardless of horsepower, register it with the Secretary of State prior to the operation of the watercraft. A fee of \$3.00 is required and the number is valid for three years. The numbers assigned will consist of four letters and four numbers. They will never change, they will remain with that boat during it's useful life or continued use in Michigan. These identification numbers must not be less than three inches in height and the color must contrast with the color of the hull. They must be grouped so as to leave a space between the letters and the numbers. Applications for registration can be obtained at the Sheriff's Office.

Historically Speaking

The summer of 1964 marks the 18th summer of the existence of the Omena-Traverse Yacht Club. Starting with a membership of 37, membership as of the last count is now 189. As it is the intention of the present Board of Directors to place pictures of past commodores in the club, it was thought that it might be well to review briefly for the membership, some of the significant facts in the growth of the club. Accordingly, your editor with the able assistance of Marjorie Renz have searched through the records of the club and listed the following information.

Decause the early records are somewhat incomplete in details and because some facts were overlooked, or shall we say not mentioned specifically in the minutes or annual reports, it is recognized that many improvements have not been mentioned. This does not mean that there was any intention of doing so, but that it seemed impossible to find the recorded dates of such improvements.
