### A Valuable Experience

Late in August of this summer, I received a chance to go and race in the Sunfish North American Championships at Watertown, New York. I feel this was truly a valuable and interesting experience for any dedicated sailor.

I arrived in Watertown on August 24 just in time to grab a shower and make it to the skippers' meeting. Immediately after, there was a get-together party that advertised free beer. Wednesday, August 25, three races were scheduled with lunch on the water. The wind was so dead that it took eleven hours to race those three races; with only a sandwich and a can of pop to eat all day, which they served to us on the water. We left shore at fifteen minutes to nine in the morning and returned at eight that night. For more than eleven hours we drifted around the course trying to qualify for the Championship Series. For four days we kept this schedule up; with little variation except for the storm that cancelled sailing affer the second race on Saturday.

There were three sailors in our group from Omena. However, Jerry Besaw became ill and fainted in the second race on the first day. He failed to sail again after that. Jed Mooney developed a leak in his boat that almost caused him to sink in the second race. He did not return to the action until two days later. So, I was really the only Omena sailor to participate in the qualifying. I finished 75th out of some 150 boats; in which ages of the sailors ranged from twelve to fifty.

It is true that the competition is tough, but you will never find anyone more hospitable than a Sunfish sailor. The too competitors were net only friendly but very helpful. If you ever get a chance to race in something of this sort, do not pass up the opportunity. You will never be sorry and I guarantee you will profit from the experience.

### Treasurer's Report

Your new Treasurer took office at the last meeting of the OTYC Board in September and the books of the Club were provided to me about October 1st. The records show that there was \$527.33 in the General Fund account and \$10.90 in the Improvement Fund account. These amounts have been checked with the bank in Sutoos Bay and found to be correct.

In reviewing the financial affairs of the Club for the past year, it was noted the Teunis, Youth and Sailing programs came close to paying their own way. The Auction at the Club produced revenue of \$109.55 (all profit) and members who donated their White Elephants and those that bid on the same are due a hearty "Thanks".

Additional income came from the sale of sweatshirts, parkas, maps and by donations of members themselves. However, it is the DUES which cover the financial load of the Club. It was baffling to understand that the Coke Machine (which should produce some profit) didn't!

Principal expenditures of the Club were for taxes, mainly County, Township and State, but, also, there were some Federal, too. We are not a tax exempt organization by any stretch of the imagination. The local taxes were \$622.47 for the biggest bite. Insurance costs were heavy, being over \$1,900.00 — but some of this is prepaying premiums on the Club property. Maintenance of the Club is the next biggest item. I should be remiss if I did not mention that under maintenance items, there is a significant amount of vandalism, which takes its toll. There has been some within the Club as well as to dub grounds. We would hope that evidence of this would lessen in the coming year. In any event, with the funds in the bank and few bills expected till the 1st of the year, The Club is "solvent". Shortly after the 1st of the year, we will be sending out notices for Dues for 1977 and it would be most helpful if members would remit promptly, as the taxes for the County, etc., will then be due and will pretty well deplete the cash reserves and it is unlikely that we can look for any reduction in these taxes. The records indicate that six members are delinquent in their dues for 1978 and the Treasurer is obliged to post delinquent notices at the Club — hopefully this will not be necessary.

I would also appreciate it if members would help in the up-dating of the records of members and their families, so in the notices which you will receive, please indicate any corrections. We are especially in need of getting the ages of the children. As you know, children uper the age of 14 are "free". Children, or should I say, "young adults", are \$6.00, while those over 18 are "Adults" and pay the normal \$25.00 Dues.

As an item of news, likely you will be interested in the fact that the Bay water level is "way down" and this is very apparent at the Club. Snow has already been on the ground; our Commodore has finally moved to Omena Point (altho he's on the Ingalis Bay side); and we're all happy and hope that you are too!

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
